

## PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

**MAY 2019** 

## Parish Council Report - May 2019

The meeting opened with 8 members of the public and a full complement of 7 Councillors giving a shortfall of 4



## **Councillors Report:**

There was no report from SCC Cllr Green in his absence. Cllr Welham voiced his thanks to all who had re-elected him and Rachel Eburne to be MSDC Councillors. He advised that Rachel will be attending forthcoming Stowupland Parish Council meetings but was unable to attend this month due to being in hospital. He gave details about the possible make up of the new District Council.

## **Public Forum:**

Following an earlier meeting held between Councillors and a number of residents of Thorney Green and subsequent discussion, Councillors agreed to ask SCC to extend the sandbags around the splay of their track to help to prevent further damage, and to ask if they can repair damage already caused by school traffic to the entrance of the track itself. They also agreed to install 2 posts either side of the entrance to both tracks and to reinstate and reseed The Green edging onto the tracks. It was also pointed out that parking opposite these tracks caused problems with getting in to and out of their properties. A resident advised that the track between Green Farm and the road had some very large pot holes that require repair. It was also noted that a number of parents are parking their cars too close to the A1120 junction which is unlawful and making it very difficult for through traffic to access the junction. Another resident noted that footpath 51 was becoming overgrown with stinging nettles making walking difficult.

#### **Pensions:**

A financial advisor has been found to provide a report on pension requirement and it was agreed that they should go ahead for the price quoted.

#### CIL:

The Clerk reported on a response from MSDC regarding a request to use CIL monies agreed for the provision of an aluminium framed notice board in the village to be used instead for a cheaper solid oak notice board. This request was refused but there is still time to cancel the original request and submit a fresh application to include all the notice boards. It was also agreed that CIL monies already granted and put into the PC current account need to be distributed between bank accounts in order to maintain the correct levels.

## **Grass Cutting Schedule:**

It was agreed to accept the quotation for footpath cutting as set out on the new schedule.

## **Sub-Committee Reports:**

The Clerk presented an excellent report on the possible make-up of committees and responsibilities for Councillors. The recommendations were agreed. It is hoped that either more Councillors will come forward to stand for the Parish Council and/or residents will be prepared to help out with committees that they are interested in. It was agreed to advertise for someone to oversee the condition and maintenance of trees in the village.

**Allotments** – Cllr Voden is to try and recruit some allotment holders to help out with the allotment committee.

Cemetery and Churchyard – Some painting work needs to be completed on the cemetery building but what had been done looks very good. The recommendation for the tree work that needs to be done was agreed, as was the spraying where the laurels were. It was recommended that 3 small signs strategically placed should be erected to remind families that glass and ceramics should not be placed on graves as they are a hazard to the grass cutting contractor. It was agreed that a letter needs to be sent to the family of a grave that has artificial flowers all over it preventing the grave from being cut. It was also recommended that a cemetery caretaker needs to be hired flexibly to cover approx. 2 hours per fortnight to keep the cemetery free of debris and unauthorised pots etc. Some sunken graves need to be brought up to level with topsoil and reseeded. It was also noted that the war graves sign has been placed on the gate.

**Neighbourhood Planning** – The referendum is due to be undertaken in June.

**Planning** – It was agreed to object to the planning application submitted by Bloor Homes to cut down on the number of bungalows and larger

houses on Phase 2 and construct an extra 19 properties. This goes against the density stipulated by the Govt. Planning Inspector amongst other things.

The Clerk was also asked to check for any easements for residential access across The Green for the change of use from agriculture to residential for the building at Pooles Farm.

**Transport, Travel and Safety** – Cllr Voden thanked all those to took part in the recent traffic count.

## **Councillors' Reports:**

Cllr Studd advised that the police have been undertaking a lot of speed checks in the village over the last few weeks.

Cllr Welham questioned whether the declaration regarding the use of recording/photographing by the public needs to be read out at the start of each meeting as it is stated on the agenda paper that each member of the public is given. Clerk to check this with SALC. He advised that the new anti-slip strips are great but that the netting had not been removed from one of the bridges. He also asked if the new SID device on order records the actual speed so that data can then be downloaded and used by the Police. He was advised that it did not; the device to be installed is what was recommended by the Police although the advice given to Old Newton was different. He suggested that an article be placed in Telstar for residents to adopt road signs to keep them clean as has been proved very successful in Haughley. He also felt that it was important to make formal application to MSDC regarding the future stewardship of Thrandestones Meadow before the planning application submitted by Gladman for the adjoining field is determined. Should planning permission be given for that field, Stowupland does not want the care of the meadow to be undertaken by a management committee.

Cllr Murton advised that she has noted that a lot of bicycles are being ridden through footpath 32 and Cllr Welham has agreed to request a PCSO to monitor this along with the parking close to the A1120 junction.

Cllr Johnson advised that the tree behind the new bench on the half a mow needs to be cut back along with some of the undergrowth in order to keep the bench clean and in good order. Also, the hole by the cement base needs to be filled in.

Cllr Voden reported that he is following up the information required in respect of a water supply to the allotments and will bring this back to Parish Council.

Cllr Reeves advised that the trees need to be cut back by the bridge near the Church.

## **Correspondence:**

It was agreed to give permission for the Mayor of Stowmarket to wear her chain of office at the forthcoming Stowmarket Band Concert to be held in the village hall.

Cllr Voden agreed to speak and do the reading at the community celebration service at Holy Trinity Church.

Cllr Reeves agreed to attend the SCC self help meeting as she filled in the original survey.

The Local History Group has advised that a new Village Recorder has been appointed.

A resident has voiced concern about the state of the undergrowth encroaching onto the footpath that runs between the Church and Freemans School. Cllr Reeves agreed to clear any undergrowth coming from the Churchyard despite there being no current evidence that this is a closed churchyard in which case it should be the responsibility of the PCC.

Another resident reacted to the recent article in Telstar about dog poo as they felt there were few places to walk in the village. A footpath map is to be sent to them. It was also pointed out that some of the dog bins are not being emptied frequently enough and this is being urgently addressed.

The meeting closed at 9.15pm.

## Stowupland Neighbourhood Plan – the final hurdle Referendum 6th June

I am very pleased to be able to write this short information bulletin about the final stage of Stowupland's Neighbourhood Plan. The time has come to vote.

The referendum will be held on Thursday 6th June 2019 and the question that will be put to residents of the parish is:

"Do you want Mid Suffolk District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for Stowupland to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area?"

The Referendum will be similar to the local government elections that we've just had, and with the European elections at the end of May we will be used to turning up and posting our votes in the black ballot boxes.

A copy of the Neighbourhood Plan incorporating the Examiner's Modifications and the other documents (such as the Independent Examiner's Report and copies of the written representations and the Parish Council's response submitted to the Examiner) can be inspected during normal opening hours at the following places:

# COUNTRYSIDE RAMBLER BRIAN WARD

I love this time of year for many reasons; to walk across dewy meadows early in the morning listening to the dawn chorus as the milky sun rises through the mist. A Cuckoo is calling in the distance and a Wood Pigeon is cooing in a nearby wood. I startle a Muntjac as I turn a corner; it also took me by surprise. I compose myself and walk on. The sun is getting higher as I enter the wood, a Pigeon flies away clapping its wings on the way. I smell the sweetness of Bluebells, also Ransoms with its pungent aroma of garlic as it hits my nostrils. I walk along the pathway with no other person in sight. I glance at my watch; it is only 5. 30 am and tell myself that is why I am alone. I suddenly get a whiff of a Fox with its musty scent hanging in the stillness of the morning air. A Squirrel hurriedly scampers up a tree, surprised to see a human in its domain at such an unearthly hour.

I stand for a while just listening. I hear a Turtle Dove with its distinctive purr, purr, far, far away in the distance, and smile to myself; this is the sound of summer. The sun rises even higher and the Wood Anemones lift their heads and open wide to greet it. I hear a rustle nearby and glimpse the black and white rear end of a Badger as it returns home from its nocturnal foraging. I come across its foraging spot, holes dug along the pathway; I expect it was looking for Earthworms or even bulbs. A Green Woodpecker calls its yaffling note as I walk along the path, then a Jay screeches at me from a nearby oak tree but still hidden from sight in the leafy canopy.

I see a dog in the distance followed by its owner; we meet and a cheery "good morning" is exchanged; they disappear into the wood followed by the noisy Jay. I hear a Buzzard call its mewing note. I look skyward in the direction of the sound to discover two birds rising on the first warm thermals of the day. They ascend higher until only specks in the sky; they drift eastwards into the rising sun. A breeze is now evident as the morning progresses, a Skylark is singing as I leave the wood, a wonderful song as it climbs into the blue sky on quivering wings. On the edge of the wood Oxeve Daisies are dancing in the soft breeze and a large Bumble Bee is kept busy attempting to land on them to gather nectar as they wave to and fro. I follow the footpath across a field and flush a pair of Partridges; they fly off with fast wing beats then a long glide, and they are gone in seconds. A large flock of Crows are feeding on a freshly drilled field. They may take a few grains of barley but make up for it by eating the Wire Worms and Leather Jackets that farmers detest. The arable fields are a mosaic of colour now, the bright yellow of oil seed rape, fresh greens of barley and wheat and the sugar beet is covering the brown soil beneath it with its shiny green leaves.

I approach a bramble thicket; two Rabbits hop along with their white tails bobbing along behind them. They disappear into the thicket and disturb a male Linnet that was nearby; it alights on a bare twig and sings its melodious little song, short it may be, but very tuneful. I glance at my watch once more, 6. 15 am, the day has just started but it is the best time of day. With thoughts of what I have seen and heard I head home for some breakfast.

If you think you would enjoy all of this before breakfast in just a few hours it is out there and free. GO TRY IT!!!

## May Meeting

John Goodhand's wonderfully illustrated talk taught us a great deal. His collection of photographs of inn signs, some from the 1960s, is clearly important: over 100 inns are going out of business per week but the signs record national, local and social history.

The Romans, who drank wine, put out bunches of vine leaves for signs; hop poles with leaves were more suited to English tastes. Richard II decreed that all inns should have signs and, as most people could not read, pictorial signs were introduced. Ale-conners had the task of checking the quality of the ale. It is said that they would spill a little on a bench and then sit on it for a while. If their leather breeches stuck to the bench they would conclude that the ale had been over-sweetened.

Inn signs on busy roads have to be simple, while those in quieter places have more detail – and often humour. 'The Royal Oak' shows Roundheads searching around the foot of the tree, while Charles II's feet are visible in the branches; 'The Quiet Woman' is decapitated. 'The Station' became 'The Silent Whistle' after Dr Beeching's reduction of train lines. In some cases, the two sides of the sign are different: 'The Gypsy Moth' in Greenwich shows Francis Chichester's yacht on one side and his bi-plane on the other. Names such as 'The Smelter's Arms' are found where there were once steelworks, while 'The Navigation' is common in the Midlands, because of the number of canals there.

Some inns have church-related signs: 'Adam and Eve' (in Paradise, Gloucestershire), 'The Angel', and 'The Church Inn', for example. In Bury St Edmunds, 'The One Bull', built into the ancient walls of the Abbey, referred to a Papal Bull, rather than an animal. Animals and birds are common subjects however, as is heraldry. And the most common sign? 'The Red Lion', which was the badge of John of Gaunt.

Taking John Goodhand's advice, anyone spotting an unusual or interesting inn sign should photograph it at once: it may be gone if you go back another day.

#### **Local Recorder**

Hi, I am Sandra Walker; I look after the Archives for Stowupland Local History Group and because of this I have now agreed to take on the role of Village Recorder. Each year I will complete a report in which I will reflect on what Stowuplanders have been up to, how Stowupland is changing or even what has stayed the same. This report, along with reports from all the other Suffolk recorders, will be lodged with The Suffolk Record Office so that future generations can see what life was like for us.

To do this, especially as I am a relatively new comer, I could really do with some assistance.

I already have some 'little elves' that are prepared to supply me with cuttings from the local press and other publications. But, in addition, it would be very helpful if anyone from local clubs or organisations, especially those who don't already submit write-ups to Telstar, might like to give me updates as to what's going on and what they are doing.

It would also be great if any keen photographers can supply me with snapshots of village life, especially of progress with any new developments or maybe 3 monthly views of the same areas. Maybe you or someone you know would like an excuse to get out and about with their camera.

## **Talking Point**

Neil Langridge writes:

Between the Reformation of the Church in 1538 and 1830 hardly any new churches were built in Suffolk as every parish had a church and if more room was required an aisle could be added or a gallery with extra seating erected. From the first half of the 19th century the population of the county's larger towns, especially Ipswich, began to rise and parishes were divided, creating new parishes with their own new parish churches to cater for this growing population in a time when most people attended church. Possibly the first new church to be built was Holy Trinity in Fore Hamlet Ipswich in 1835.

Stowupland was perhaps unique in Suffolk as, while being an independent parish it did not have and never had had a parish church but shared Stowmarket's church. The reasons for this arrangement are unclear. However by 1840 the need for the parish to have its own church was becoming pressing, not least because the various non-conformist congregations were expanding in the area at that time. The new church was ready in 1843. The dedication was probably the choice of the Reverend Hollingsworth, the driving force behind the fundraising required.

Holy Trinity is not a common dedication in the county. Hollingsworth, having researched the history of the area for his 1844 publication 'The History of Stowmarket,' may have been aware that the manor of Thorney Hall which covered most of Stowupland had been held by the Priory of Ingham in Norfolk. The Priory had been given the manor in 1389 and held it until the dissolution of the monasteries. The priory was of the Order of the Most Holy Trinity also known as Trinitarians. This is only speculation but seems to me to be a possible explanation of the dedication.

One last point of interest is that the person who donated the manor of Thorney Hall to the Priory of Ingham was a John de Saxham. It may be only coincidence but it is tempting to think there is some connection with Saxham Street here.

For our next 'Talking Point', sometime before the age of the motor car, one village character was fined for dangerous driving with a horse and cart. Who was it?



## **Church Message**

"All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them." (Acts 2 verse 4)

As a nation there is one thing that is a constant topic of conversation (and it's not Brexit!) and that is the weather. We may complain about our weather but there is something comforting about our seasons. There is always something to say, to see and to wonder at. Conversations can range from it being too hot or too cold or from drought conditions to floods. We see the effect different conditions have on our gardens and

how the different seasons bring different flowers. Where the bare brown ground of winter springs into life with green shoots and the awesome sight of the vast array of flowers and vegetables that result. Then there is always the wonder.... the wonder of the sight of amazing clouds, and some of our sunsets take your breath away. Then there is the wonder of will there be enough rain to make the seeds grow; will the frost get my cherry blossom; will those parsnip seeds peek up this year? For us in England, we are usually exceedingly fortunate as drought is often followed by rain and cold is followed by the warm sun. Although, after the summer conditions of Easter and the frosty nights of May, we may not always know when to expect each type of weather! But, in general, we can be sure that spring will follow winter, summer will follow spring and autumn will follow summer.

Just like the weather. Christian seasons are to be talked about, to be seen and to wonder at. At Christmas there is joy for the birth of a new born baby, our Lord Jesus Christ. At Easter we have the heart wrenching scenes of our Lord on the cross, but then the amazing truth of the resurrection. As we enter June our thoughts may turn to summer, but our thoughts also turn to another season in our Christian life. Sunday June 9th is the 7th Sunday after Easter, Pentecost or Whit Sunday, where we celebrate the Holy Spirit descending on Jesus' disciples. After the overwhelming drama of Easter, Pentecost can sometimes feel like a minor event, but it is a key moment in our Christian Faith. The Holy Spirit had been with the world from the beginning...first mentioned in Genesis verse 1 "And the Spirit of God was hovering over the face of the waters." But here at Pentecost we see it now revealed in a different manner. The Holy Spirit is completely revealed because of what Christ had done for us. At Pentecost, something was set in motion that is still reverberating today. For us, of the Christian tradition, this event also represents the birth of the early Church.

Then, move on a week and we come to Sunday June 16th which is Trinity Sunday...one to get your head around. In my Christian life I've heard so many explanations of the Trinity but it still causes confusion of thought... God the Father...God the Son...God the Holy Spirit....wow what a concept, something to really wonder about in all senses of the word.

Whatever you are doing this June take time to speak of your faith; to look at the works of God; and to wonder at God's love for all.

## **Bonny Wood Barking Tye**

The dry weather has helped us to get on well with our winter work programme and the volunteers have cleared around the pond and created more scalloped ride edges to let in the sunlight. Richard Cage and his Virgin Media colleagues have done a great job in widening the ride we share with James Buckle's part of the wood, and now it is all done, it looks fabulous.

A significant milestone was passed in February when the Mid Week Team coppiced the compartment by the field entrance: it was last done in the late 1980's and this is the first area to be re-cut under the Suffolk Wildlife Trust's stewardship of the wood. The hazel re-growth was really strong and it is great to see the wood really getting back into the cycle of coppice management with all the benefits for wildlife, such as dormice, woodland birds and butterflies, that this brings. The management plan for Bonny is now up for revision and we look forward to bringing more of the wood into coppice rotation, cleaning out the pond again and continuing to improve the rides so they are more attractive to wildlife.
